## **Background and Objectives**

The movement for Open Government has created the spaces for revolutionizing the way governments work across the world, generating the space for active citizen participation and driving efficiencies in governments. Open Contracting is a prime example of the transformative nature that open government innovations have had. Open Contracting is about publishing and using open, accessible and timely information on government contracting to engage citizens and businesses in identifying and fixing public procurement problems. Making the contracting process more transparent had proven to have an impact on improving competitiveness, lowering barriers to entry for small and medium-size enterprises, as well as curbing corruption and strengthening trust in the process.

Around 35 governments worldwide currently implement Open Contracting as a way to create access to public procurement information and engage stakeholder to make procurement more efficient and transparent. Local governments and major cities are realizing its potential as well. About half of those governments are actively implementing the Open Contracting Data Standard, the open data standard for public procurement that is at the heart to unlocking and re-use of data in ways that have not been imagined before. Countries working with Open Contracting include France, the United Kingdom, Ukraine, Mexico, Argentina, Chile, Moldova, Albania, Georgia, and others. An increasing number of other governments is committing to join the club. Municipalities are at the lead in Spain and Italy.

Public contracting is the bricks and mortar of public benefit, where taxpayers' money gets converted into schools, roads and hospitals, and other indispensable public goods. It is vital to modernize governments in states and cities to fight corruption, reform markets, and foster innovation and entrepreneurship. More effective and transparent procurement through open, clean contracting is crucial to sustainable development. While there is very little reliable data on the size of procurement as a part of the economy, the European Union calculates the average share of public procurement in the GDP of its 28 member states to be 16%, the OECD estimates that percentage to be 12% for its member countries, [whereas the World Trade Organization estimates the share of public procurement in GDP globally to be between 10 and 15%.](#)

Electronic procurement and digital e-gov services offer an unprecedented opportunity to revolutionize the way public procurement is done. Digital processes enable smart intelligence services for business, central or local governments and citizens. At the heart of all of it are open and reliable data, user-friendly online tools and an engaged community.

On the 22 October 2018, United Nations Development Programme teamed up with Open Contracting Partnership, the European Bank for Reconstruction and Development and the World Trade Organisation to host Open Contracting activists and stakeholders from the Western Balkans and Central Europe for a workshop to discuss opportunities to improve public spending using Open Government tricks and tools available.

## **Objectives of the workshop**

The meeting will bring together representatives from different countries, sectors and stakeholder groups, including (1) Open Government community; (2) municipal governments and (3) digital government and digital procurement implementers to:

- Introduce the idea and philosophy of Open Government and Open Contracting to national and municipal leaders and other stakeholders in the region and beyond;
- Share new projects, approaches, and tools to advance Open Contracting in digital public procurement;

- Support each other in exploring opportunities and challenges related to implementing the Open Contracting Data Standard;
- Celebrate progress, learning, and growing of the Open Contracting community.
